

An organization's annual report can hardly be labeled as statistics. It is not just about numbers, facts, and descriptions of the assistance provided, it is the story of one year of life of people and organizations. In our case, it is life and service during war.

The cover of this year's report features the director of Caritas-Spes Odesa, Rev. Piotr Rosochatski, and a resident of the village of Bilozerka in the Kherson Region. After Russian troops destroyed the Kakhovka dam on June 6, the flooding caused a major environmental and humanitarian disaster. Our teams joined the immediate response efforts.

The photo shows how we had to swim through the street where people used to walk along just a short time ago. Father Piotr brought humanitarian aid to the village and is trying to assess the extent of the destruction so that in the evening, at a meeting of directors, he can tell what kind of help people need. "Sometimes the water was higher than the fences, and the only thing visible parts of the houses were the roofs..." Rev. Piotr recounts what he saw. Then, the team of our Caritas ants writes, reports, purchases, transports, consoles... and all this while carrying a tornado of their personal war inside them for 10 years.





Two years have passed since Russia invaded our country. We, Ukrainians, have become accustomed to perceiving this war as part of our daily lives. The shock we experienced from the aggressor's invasion is gradually becoming a habit. However, we cannot simply accept this phenomenon because the scale of destruction in our country is overwhelming. The number of dead, both military and civilians, including many children, is staggering. The number of widowed women or men and orphaned children is staggering. The scale of the destruction of our cities and villages and the people who, deprived of their homes, were forced to seek refuge both in Ukraine and abroad are staggering.

It is very important for us Ukrainians to realize that the civilized world has not forgotten about us and our tragedy. The proof of this is the extensive assistance from individual countries, organizations, and even individuals. For us, people of faith in Ukraine, it is important to realize that other brothers in faith around the world support us, both with prayer and humanitarian aid. Proof of this is the long-standing activity in our country of the religious mission Caritas-Spes, where we have the honor to serve. Our organization implements numerous projects thanks to funds raised primarily from believers around the world who want us, despite all our troubles, not to forget the face of a merciful God who sees everything and cares for everyone. We thank God, who inspires all of them to be with us. We thank Him for the opportunity to serve Him in our poor and disadvantaged brothers.

«War is a total evil that destroys everything: the environment, the usual way of life, relationships, and the most valuable thing of all — the human being. I am reminded of a short poem by Viktoriya Amelina:

«Air raid alert across the country
As if everyone is being led to be shot every time
And they aim only at one
Mostly the one on the sidelines
Not you today, alarm over».

She wrote this poem on April 5, 2022, and on July 1, 2023, she was killed in a missile attack on Kramatorsk. She is survived by her ten-year-old son. No numbers or statistics can convey the pain that Ukrainians continue to experience. Almost 300 thousand kilometers of land have been mined in the occupied territories. Water bodies and soils have been poisoned, and ecosystems have been destroyed. The country, once called the breadbasket of Europe, is suffering in the furnace of war. Experts gloomily predict that it will take more than 700 years to demine the territory alone. More than 3.3 million people in need of assistance live in frontline communities in the east and south of the country. In these parts of Ukraine, including the areas under the temporary Russian control, millions of people are struggling to gain adequate access to water, food, healthcare, shelter, protection, and other essential services and goods. Thanks to the unwavering support of the international community, Caritas-Spes Ukraine has been able to rapidly implement rapid response programs that have helped avert a humanitarian catastrophe, at least in the areas controlled by the Ukrainian government, which took tremendous effort. The flow of aid remains uninterrupted, a testament to the solidarity of our partners — Caritas organizations from different countries, as well as diplomatic missions, governments, and numerous humanitarian organizations that continue to stand by our side.

This unity is embodied in countless humanitarian projects and programs aimed at restoring, providing and supporting both bodies and souls. During the two years of full-scale war, Caritas-Spes Ukraine, together with its partners, has reached more than 15,000 settlements, including in frontline areas. Today, more than 100 partners support the activities of Caritas-Spes Ukraine. Thanks to this support, more than 1.1 million beneficiaries have received assistance since February 24, 2022.

According to numerous military and political experts, the war could drag on for decades. We must be prepared to provide long-term assistance to overcome the significant humanitarian crisis unfolding in Ukraine, which will ultimately affect the global community. For two years now, we have been carrying the cross of service despite the missiles, explosions, air raid sirens, and the deaths of our loved ones. Through supplicating prayers for peace. Over the years, we have successfully paved the way for helping and supporting people with various needs; but, unfortunately, there are still many human lives and hearts destroyed by war ahead. We thank our partners for helping us to carry the cross of service in times of war.

## KEY EVENTS

#### **January**

On January 28, a delegation from Caritas Europe, led by its President Michael Landau and the future Director of International Cooperation and Humanitarian Director Jean-Yves Terlinden, visited Irpin, Bucha, and surrounding villages.

#### **February**

On the anniversary of the outbreak of full-scale war in Ukraine, the team of the Caritas-Spes Ukraine National Office held a joint prayer of the Way of the Cross called «366th Station» live on the Caritas Internationalis YouTube channel. This prayer was written by the staff of the national office of Caritas-Spes Ukraine, expressing their personal experiences and stories. The prayer became a symbol of unity in grief and solidarity with Ukrainians around the world.

#### March

Launch of training on the implementation of project management programs, which significantly affected the organizational capacity of the Mission. Presentation of the Mission's activities at the Conference of Bishops of the RCC in Ukraine. Start of preparations for a project that opened a new area of assistance - livelihood.

#### **April**

On April 12-13, 2023, Caritas-Spes Ukraine held a meeting of partners entitled «Synergy of Good — Synergy of God». More than two dozen representatives of partner organizations gathered to discuss plans and summarize the results of projects already implemented.

#### May

Caritas International General Assembly, a European conference and a meeting with Pope Francis.

#### June

The destruction of the Kakhovka hydroelectric power plant caused a technogenic and environmental disaster. Caritas-Spes Ukraine initiated a nationwide relief campaign that was conducted in all parishes of the Roman Catholic Church in Ukraine. During the week, Roman Catholic parishes collected almost one million hryvnias and more than 21 tons of humanitarian aid to help the residents of Kherson Region. Caritas-Spes Ukraine received a major award at the Charitable Ukraine 2022 national competition and the Charity Compass, which demonstrates the trust in the mission and its recognition in the NGO sector.

#### July

A pilot project in the village of Zarichany, Zhytomyr Region, to rehabilitate children and youth with disabilities.

#### **August**

On August 29-31, Caritas Spes Ukraine held a congress of regional Caritas Spes Unio teams. Representatives of all diocesan teams came together for the first national meeting of this scale. 140 participants from different parts of Ukraine, from dozens of cities and towns. Both from the frontline regions and those that, despite their relatively safe locations, have become humanitarian shelters for the whole country.

#### **September**

On the night of September 19, 2023, Russian missiles attacked an industrial enterprise in Lviv, which housed a Caritas-Spes Ukraine humanitarian aid warehouse. The mission's employees were not injured, but the warehouse and about 300 tons of humanitarian aid were destroyed.

#### **October**

Cooperation agreements with The International Catholic Migration Commission (ICMC) were signed.

#### **November**

Presentation of the achievements of Caritas-Spes Ukraine at the 59th plenary session of the Conference of Bishops of the RCC in Ukraine. This opportunity served as a confirmation of unity with the Church and a sign of attention to the ministry of Caritas-Spes Ukraine. Charity dinner for the poor and homeless on the occasion of the VII World Day of the Poor. The volunteer of the event was Ms. Mateja Prevolšek, a Slovenian diplomat, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of Slovenia to Ukraine.

#### **December**

On December 8, an inclusive center for people with disabilities was opened in the village of Zarichany, Zhytomyr Region. The main concept of the center is to provide barrier-free accessibility for people who use wheelchairs and those with other forms of disabilities.



During the year of the full-scale invasion, Caritas-Spes Ukraine received support from more than 120 donor organizations. This chart includes only the largest contributions.




